THURSDAY

AM: Arrival in San Cristobal Airport and Transfer to the boat

PM: San Cristobal: Lobos Island

One of the many islets that pepper the archipelago, this one is named for the mass amounts of sea lions that invade the area. Often used as a check-out dive site, Lobos Island is a sweet dive filled with star fish, rays, various fish, turtles, eagle rays, and sometimes marine iguanas.

Highlights: Sea lions by the dozens

Experience: Open water diver, with a minimum of 10 dives

Depth: 3-10 m (10-33 feet)

Currents: Light

Water Temp: 17 C -23 C / 63 F – 73F, depending on the season and special conditions

Thermoclines: Not generally

Difficulty: Beginner

Visibility: 6-12 M (20-40 ft)

Unique Animals: Galapagos garden eel, many endemic fish

Interesting facts: The sea lions here welcome you to Galapagos with friendly under water

FRIDAY:

AM: Marchena Island: Espejo Point

This is the most famous dive site in the Galapagos Islands and recognized as one of the best dive sites in the world. Accessible only by dive liveaboards, Darwin Island is an underwater Disneyland.

Experience required: Minimum 50 divesand experience in current, cold water and surge. **Depth:** 9-40 + M (20-130+ ft)

Currents: moderate to very strong Water

TUESDAY

Am: Isabela: Coka Port (Jun-Dec) / Fernandina: Cape Douglas (Jun-Dec)

Highlights: Fur sea lions and Galapagos sea lions mingle with the snacking marine iguanas and "zoom-past-you" penguins.

Experience required: Advanced open water and minimum 40 logged dives

Depth: 20 m (66 ft)

Currents: Moderate

Water Temp: 18 – 26 C (65-78 F)

Difficulty: Advanced

Visibility: 12-20 m (39-66 ft)

Endemic Animals: Galapagos marine iguana

Pm: Isabela: Cape Marshall (Jan-May)/Vicente Roca Point (Jun-Dec)

CAPE MARSHALL (JAN - MAY)

A near-vertical wall of volcanic rock that plummets to the bottom of the sea, this dive site boasts the big stuff: manta rays, hammerheads, sun fish (Mola mola), and sometimes huge schools of the endemic salema.

Highlights: Not only is the topography of this site distinct and fascinating, but so is the marine life! The "usual" sea turtles and sea lions swim along with you and the Chevron barracuda, yellow fin tuna, marbled rays, mobula rays, snappers, and more!

Experience: Minimum advanced open water and 30 dives. Experience with current, walls, and good buoyancy needed.

Depth: 10 -35m (33-98 feet)

Currents: Strong

Water Temp: 17 C - 23C / 63 - 73F, depending on the season and special conditions

Thermoclines: Prevalent at approximately 14 m (45 ft)

Difficulty: Advanced

Visibility: 3-10 m (10-33 feet)

Unique Animals: The Galapagos black – striped salema

Interesting facts: The red-lipped batfish can be found here, although no night diving is permitted in Galapagos, so it will be tricky to find them!

VICENTE ROCA POINT (JUN - DEC)

Highlighting an enormous amount of the "small stuff", Punta Vicente Roca offers up a sweet home to octopi, sea horses, red-lipped batfish, frogfish, and nudibranchs. The mola mola, or sun fish has been spotted here as well.

Highlights: This drift wall dive will bring you up close and personal to a long list of invertebrates including sponges and flat worms. Keep your eyes peeled for the endemic camotillo and the occasional Port Jackson shark!

Experience: Minimum open water diver with good buoyancy control

Depth: Average dive depth 20 M (66 ft)

Currents Mild to none

Water Temp: 17 - 24 C (62 - 76F), depending on the season and special conditions

Thermoclines: Variable; often below 20 m (66ft)

Difficulty: Beginner

Visibility: 8-15 m (26-49 ft)

Unique Animals: Camotillo

WEDNESDAY:

Am: Santiago Island: Cousins Rocks

Cousin's Rock

Just one of he many islets that help form the archipelago, this dive has a great deal to offer the advanced diver. With sloping rock plate formations and a wall that drops farther than the eye can see, diver will come across hidden sea horses and octopi, Galapagos black coral, frogfish, and hammerheads and Galapagos sharks!

Highlights: Green sea turtles and sea lions accompany the diver on the lookout for hammerheads and Galapagos sharks.

Experience: Minimum advanced open water diver and 30 logged dives. Divers must have good buoyancy control.

Depth: 2m – 30 m maximum dive depth (one side has a rock-plate slope)

Currents: Moderate, with surge in shallower waters

Water Temp: 17 C – 23 C / 63F – 73F, depending on the season and special conditions

Thermoclines: Often at approximately 25 meters

Difficulty: Intermediate to advanced

Visibility: 10-20 m (33-66 feet)

Unique Animals: Juvenile Galapagos black coral

Interesting facts: This site offers up a buffet of amazing sights for the diver: giant mantas bellow, sea turtles above, sea horses in the coral, and sea lions that play with your bubbles.

Pm: Santa Cruz: El Chato/Tortoise Breeding Center

EL CHATO TORTOISE RESERVE

The El Chato reserve is divided into two areas: Caseta and Chato. The trail begins at Santa Rosa (13.7 miles/22km) from Puerto Ayora , with the Caseta route being the more challenging. The reserve allows visitors to observe giant tortoise in the wild during the dry season and is also a good place to spot short-eared owls, Darwin's finches, yellow warblers, Galapagos rails and paint billed crakes.

Highlights: Giant tortoises, finches, Galapagos rails

Possible Activities: Walking, horseriding, bird watching

Type of Landing: Dry lading

Difficulty: Easy/ medium

CHARLES DARWIN STATION/FAUSTO LLERENA BREEDING CENTER

The Charles Darwin Research Station is home to turtles ranging from 3-inches (new hatchlings) to 4 feet long. Subspecies of turtles interact with one another and many of the older turtles are accustomed to humans stretching out their heads for a photo opportunity. The babies are kept until they are about four years old and strong enough to survive on their own.

Highlights: Giant tortoises in captivity

Possible Activities: Walking

Type of Landing: Dry landing

Difficulty: Easy

THURSDAY

Am: Transfer to the San Cristobal Airport
